HYDROCOTYLE RANUNCULOIDES IN WARREN COUNTY

Last June, I saw a mat of strange plants growing in shallow water at Akeley Swamp, just this side of the New York state line. It wasn't flowering, but I was able to make a tentative identification because of its resemblance to water pennywort, <u>H. americanum</u>. I returned to collect it August 1, and found it in bloom and fruiting.

According to Jennings and Avinoff's Flora and the Flora of Pennsylvania, it had not been found in Pennsylvania north or west of Franklin County. This would be an extension of 145 miles, and possibly its northernmost station outside of Oregon.
