FIELD TRIP SCHEDULE

Unless otherwise stated, all field trips start at 1:30 P.M. Note the 10 A.M. starting time for October 1. If you need more information than is given here, call our field trip chairman, Jasper Brown, at 364-8229.

Saturday, September 3 - Ohiopyle

Follow State Rte. 381 south past the park. Then after crossing a crumbling bridge, turn right up the hill and meet on the left just before crossing an iron bridge. Mark Bowers, leader.

Saturday, September 10 - Mt. Davis

This will be our last excursion to finish our plant study of the area. From Somerset, drive south on U. S. 219 to Meyersdale, then follow signs to Mt. Davis. Meet at the picnic grounds. Howard McIlvried, leader.

Saturday, September 17 - Plaingrove Bog

Leave I-79 North at the Slippery Rock exit. Drive west on State Rte. 108. At the first crossroad, turn right, and proceed to the Plaingrove Presbyterian Church on the right across from the cemetery. J. S. Brown, leader.

Saturday, September 24 - 43 Acres

Drive north on either State Routes 60 or 51, toward Aliquippa. Turn west on State Route 151. Watch for an Arco gas station on the right. Turn at this point to the right onto Independence Road (may not be labeled). Continue on this road for about 3 miles, when you will be along the Raccoon Creek valley, but you may not see the stream. Watch for a farm lane with two metal posts painted red, about 4" in diameter, on the right. Drive to the end of the lane, and you will be in our leaders' 43 Acre farm. Ponds and low areas should be lush with fall plants. Bring drinking water. Leaders, Helen and Joe Domitrovich.

Esther Allen will present the program, "Plants, the World's Pioneers.' She will outline the importance of plants to the world and mankind.
