## DR. HAROLD J. ROSE, A MEMBER SINCE 1924

A member of our Society for 62 of its 100 years, Dr. Harold J. Rose has passed away. We re-print here the obituary from the Sept. 8, 1986 Post-Gazette -

Harold J. Rose, a pioneer in coal research and a well-known nature photographer and lecturer, died Saturday in St. John's Lutheran Care Center, Mars, Butler County of heart failure following recent lung surgery. Mr. Rose, 90, of Lytton Avenue, Schenley Farms, vice president of Bituminous Coal Research Inc., at the time of his retirement in 1961, had been active in coal research for more than 40 years. He was named vice president and research director in 1944. Society of Mechanical Engineers for his contributions to the "permanent

It is our fervent hope that we will see at the banquet some of our members who were so very active in years gone by.

Honorary member Werner Buker, past-president of our Society and a member for 41 years, has sent in his reservation. Mr. Buker has done volunteer work at The Carnegie Museum Herbarium since 1945. He is well-known for the collecting he has done for the Herbarium. Among the many, many specimens he contributed to the Herbarium was the <u>Trollius laxus</u> that he found in Plaingrove Bog. It had not been seen for 100 years.

Also coming will be Dr. Anthony J. Miklausen, a member for more than 50 years. Dr. Miklausen was a student at Pitt with the late Dr. O. E. Jennings his teacher and mentor. He holds a Ph. D. in Paleobotany. He was Director of Institutional Research at Shippensburg University. He held more than 30 foreign and domestic patents on various fuel processes and had published 80 papers on the results of his research. In 1958 he received the Worcester Reed Warner Medal from the American

literature of engineering."

A graduate of Yankton College, he did graduate work at the University of Chicago and the former Carnegie Institute of Technology, now Carnegie Mellon University. He also worked for Koppers Co. and was a senior fellow at Mellon Institute.

At the end of World War II, he was commissioned by the U.S. Army to tour Western Europe and report on the status of the coal industry there.

Mr. Rose's nature photos were published in many national magazines, including Life. After retirement, he lectured extensively for Western Pennsylvania Conservancy and conducted tours of various nature preserves.

Our September 27 outing to Slippery Rock was the last for the year, completing a very interesting series of field trips. The position of field trip chairman is one of the most demanding in the Society, and Esther Allen has handled this superbly. I wonder how many of us realize the enormous amount of time and effort involved. Thanks, Esther!
