Directions: From Pittsburgh, take Rt 51 south through Elizabeth. Turn left on Rt 136 and drive toward West Newton. Just before the West Newton Bridge, park in the lot outside a Revco drug store on the left side of Rt 136.

Expectations: The highlight of the summer species here should be the yellow passionflower.

July 25 - TITUS BOG, ERIE COUNTY

Starting Time - 12:00 noon

Directions: From Pgh., take I-79 north to Rt 6N (Edinboro exit) east through Union City. After taking the turn out of Union City, drive 5.7 miles to the intersection of Rt 89 north, where we will meet at the Blatt Bros. Drive-In.

Expectations: On this visit to the bog we own jointly with the Presque Isle Audubon Society, we will be looking for the white fringed orchid. To enter this bog requires climbing over some treefall and sinking in knee-deep mud; wear washable shoes.

August 1 - JENNINGS PRAIRIE, BUTLER COUNTY

Starting Time - 1:30 pm

Directions: From Rt 422 take Rt 528 north through Moraine State Park to Jennings. Park at the Blazing Star parking area across from the nature center.

Expectations: This amazing concentration of summer wildflowers includes the dense blazing star and the small flowered purple fringed orchid. The prairie loop is perfectly level but exposed to the sun.



Some of the plants were practically hanging on the steep cliff sides - some of the people too! The terrain was different from our usual hiking areas. There was a wonderful group of flowers for us to see - among them firsts for many of us. Included among the first sightings were the Seneca Snakeroot, yellow pimpernel (Who in our group has not read The Scarlet Pimpernel - probably many years ago?), and the beautiful little red columbine really an outstanding red! It was a good day for fungi too - one large old tree had many Dryad's saddle mushrooms on it.

One roadside ditch "stream" had water cress growing in it. I picked some - not in the protected area. I now will be able to dine on dainty water cress sandwiches - like those elegant old-time ladies of yore! The sandwiches were pretty good - with a slight peppery taste.
