April 7 - Greene County

Drive south on I-79. Exit at Ruff Creek. Turn left and after a short distance, left again onto State Route 221. Continue for 4 or 5 miles to Lippincott. At the second church, Faith Baptist, turn left and meet at the third house on the right, a brick house with colonial columns, the Haywood home. Picnic lunches are welcome. April 14 - Raccoon Park

Meet in the parking lot of the Wildflower Preserve, which is on U.S. Route 30 west of Clinton. Esther Allen leader.

April 21 - No field trip scheduled.

April 28 - Cedar Creek

It is hoped that Jeffersonia will be found in bloom as well as other early spring flowers. Meet in the Howard Johnson parking lot at the junction of Rtes. 51 and I-70. This is the favorite hunting ground of our leader, Mark Bowers.

May 5 - Enelow Creek

Blue-Eyed Mary is so abundant here that it is a little difficult to imagine this as being on Pennsylvania's endangered species list, but Paul Wiegman gives it a "tentatively undetermined" rating. There will be other noteworthy plants worth seeing that are characteristic of this area. Go south on I-79 to I-70, then west to the Claysville exit. Then backtrack on U.S. 40 to the town. Turn right on State Rte. 231. Bear right at the Y, leaving Rte. 231 and continue to West Finley (still called Burnside by the local people). Turn left and continue for a few miles down a long hill, and meet at the iron bridge across Enelow Creek. Leader J. S. Brown.

May 12 - Jennings Prairie

Entrance to the parking lot is from Rte. 528 near the junction of routes 8 and 173, northwest of Butler. Many of us have not visited this spot early in the season. Leader Virginia Craig.

May 19 - State Gamelands, Wexford

From Rte. 910 east of I-79 and within its sight, turn north. After passing under I-79, turn left on the State Gamelands road. Go past the shooting ranges and park on the left where the road is somewhat wider and across from an area of shale. J. S. Brown leader.

May 26 - Wolfe Creek

Drive north on I-79. Exit at Slippery Rock. Turn left on Rte. 108. At the Dairy Queen store, about one mile from I-79, turn left and continue to the first paved road on the right. Go past the dairy farm on the left, and meet at the grassy triangular area where the road turns right. Howard McIlvried leader.

June 2 - Westminster Highlands

This is a new area for us to visit. The North Area Environmental Council has found it interesting because of five different ecological areas. It is a Presbyterian Church Camp in Scrubgrass Township. A suggested way is to drive north on I-79, east on I-80, pick up State Route 208 at Clintonville. Continue on 208 toward Emlenton. About 2 miles before you reach Rte. 38, the entrance to the camp will be on the left. Howard McIlvried leader.

This is the date selected for the annual visit to our own bog, jointly owned with the Presque Isle Audubon Society. The elusive Arethusa grows in relative abundance, and should be in bloom. Meet at the State rest stop on U.S. Rte. 6 and State Rte. 89 between Union City and Corry. Bob Morgan leader.
