## September 1 - Raccoon Park

It's probably a week or two too late to find the Grass of Parnassus at its best, but since we have not visited the bog this year at any time, let us give it a try. Drive north on I-79 to the Slippery Rock exit. Turn west toward Harlansburg on Route 108. Turn right at the first crossroad to Plaingrove. ## SMALL WHITE LADIES' SLIPPER

A letter from Joyce Bender, dated August 11, 1984

Dear Bob,

Thank you for sending me a copy of your newsletter. Your trip to view <u>Platanthera ciliaris</u> sounds interesting. I saw it growing in southern Ohio in early August a few years ago and I was impressed. An added bonus was Platanthera clavellata blooming nearby.

I saw that you are considering a trip to Resthaven Wildlife Area during the second week of May. This May the <u>Cypripedium candidum</u> did not start to bloom until the 16th of May! I would suggest that you plan to come over about the 18th or so. Late frosts the past two seasons wiped out all the early buds and blooming was off a bit both years. I have seen many more than 400 in one area. Some places have over a <u>thousand</u> blooming crowns. Double- headed flowering plants have been found in the past two years also.

Spiranthes magnicamporum blooms in Resthaven during mid-September. With all the prairie species blooming in July and August, Resthaven is worth a visit most any time of the year. If you are interested, I would be glad to lead you (or anyone else willing to travel 185 miles one way) around the area and talk about one of my favorite orchids. However, it would have to be on a weekend, because I have teaching obligations next May.

Let me know if I can be of any help to you in planning your trip.
