A CONFERENCE: TOMORROW'S OASIS TODAY

We have received this invitation from the Presque Isle Audubon Society. The Presque Isle Audubon Society, as you may know, shares with the Botanical Society the ownership of Titus Bog.

Dear Prospective Participant:

On the 26-27 of September a conference on unique features of PRESQUE ISLE, Pennsylvania and the ERIE BAYFRONT will be held in Erie, Pennsylvania at Villa Maria College. A group of interested citizens organized this symposium with major funding from the Pennsylvania Coastal Zone Management Program of the Department of Environmental Resources, assisted by the Presque Isle Audubon Society and the Erie County Planning Department.

The purpose of this conference is to inform citizens, elected public officials, and interested organizations of the unique qualities of PRESQUE ISLE and the ERIE BAYFRONT. This conference intends to:

Acquaint participants with the unique features of the ERIE BAYFRONT and PRESOUE ISLE:

Present to the participants the management and development plans for the area;

Provide the format for future community resource input in form and personnel.

Speakers include representatives from CZM, DER, state parks, the U.S. Army Corp of Engineers, local authorities and a group of speakers noted for their expertise in areas of concern. A few of these include:

E. J. Kormondy - Ecology of Sandspit Ponds Morton Hoffman - Economics of Bayfront Development Bryon Greenwood - Coastal Geomorphology Dennis Whigham - Wetlands and Their Importance

A roundtable discussion will follow the first evening meal. On the second day, field trips will provide firsthand observation of the ERIE BAYFRONT and PRESQUE ISLE. This will be followed by a wrap-up discussion.

We anticipate input to the following questions: How many tourists can Presque Isle and the bayfront accommodate? How much parking is needed or should be available? What parameters should be considered to ensure a healthy, balanced environment? Should there be green areas along the bayfront? Where are the ecologically sensitive areas of Presque Isle and the bayfront? In what way can tourism be made a positive factor for the area?

Tentative registration fees are \$16 for the two days which includes meals for the first day. An observer registration fee of \$10 for the first evening includes the meal. A student registration fee is \$5 which does not include any meals. Registration forms and the complete program will be mailed in late August.

There is an opportunity for a few to go Coho fishing the day before the conference (25 September). The cost is \$67 for the day (7 AM - 5 PM) or \$46 for a half day (1 PM - 6 PM). A reservation deposit of \$20 should be sent to Capt. Walt Thompson, 201 Honey Brook, Girard, PA 16417 by 19 August. Include your name, address and phone number (work and home) and indicate you will be attending the Bayfront-Presque Isle Conference.

We look forward to your participation in this very important conference. The future of the BAYFRONT and PRESQUE ISLE depends on your input. We hope this symposium can assist all interested groups in working together for an attractive area for all.
