CAPPARIS SPINOSA

The Caper was photographed in May at Tiberias, Israel. It was growing along the street near our hotel. The plant was about 3 feet across with 7 or 8 blooms. Each bloom was about 3 inches wide. Stamens were rosepurple tipped with intensely rose anthers. The four petals were white. Stems were dark mahogany and foliage a deep green. (Phyllis Monk)

BIBLE TOURS

For the fourth year, Phipps Conservatory is offering "Plants of the Bible." Four years ago, there were 12 tours. This year there will be a total of 27.

Plagued by plaque? There is a new mouthwash being studied that promises to wash it away. It's called Viadent and contains sanguinarine, an extract taken from the bloodroot plant, <u>Sanguinaria canadensis</u>. The sanguinarine rinse interferes with bacteria's ability to convert carbohydrates into gum-eating acid. It also blocks the enzymes that destroy collagen in gum tissue. Unlike some other mouthwashes, sanguinarine doesn't stain teeth or taste terrible. It comes in mint and cinnamon flavors. Although long-term studies are still underway for this product, a number of periodontists are already advising their patients to use the mouthwash in addition to regular flossing and brushing.
