AN OPEN LETTER FROM PAUL WIEGMAN

Members of the Botanical Society:

The Pennsylvania Natural Diversity Inventory (PNDI) continues to collect information concerning the location, population size, and the status of endangered, threatened and rare plants in western Pennsylvania.

In 1986 our field work relocated several stands of Viola appalachiensis in Somerset Co.; examined the Cypripedium reginae colony at Boleratz Fen, Erie Co.; located a new colony of Dodecatheon meadia in Bedford Co.; reviewed the status of several aquadic species growing in northwestern PA. glacial lakes; and visited other sites of special concern plants in western Pennsylvania.

This work is the basis for protecting these significant plants and habitats. Through the PA Department of Environmental Resources regulations or by pointing out critical areas which become projects of the Western Pennsylvania Conservancy, many significant plants and communities saved. .

Part of the PNDI field effort is accomplished by dedicated volunteers; several of which are Botanical Society members. We thank them for their generous donation of their time and talents.

Others of you might also be interested in helping. Volunteers are provided with a list of species and locations in a area you choose. We will show you how, and what to look for in the field. If you find the plant, you will have several forms to fill out.

If you prefer confidentially of the location, we provide that through several levels of security build into the system.
