PSORALEA ONOBRYCHIS

For our December "Wildflowers", we always use a plant with a Christmas connection. This year our plant, sainfoin, has a double linkage.

The species name in Psoralea onobrychos means the bray of a donkey (Greek OVOS = A ass; BOUXW = A to bray). A reference to the donkey in the manger?

The common name of sainfoin (sometimes saintfoin) means holy clover, because it was said to have been the hay in Christ's manger.

Now this is how a non-artist made this sketch: last July, I took a slide of sainfoin in a prairie in central Ohio. I projected the slide in a table viewer with a sheet of Saran wrap taped to the viewer. Then I traced the outline on the Saran with a permanent pen. A photoprint was made. I finished the sketch, and had a reduction made.
