May 1, 1993--Wolfe Creek Starting Time: 1 P.M. (Please note the time) Leader: Howard McIlvried Directions: From Pittsburgh take L-79 porth

Directions: From Pittsburgh, take I-79 north to the Slippery Rock exit and turn left onto Rt. 108 toward Slippery Rock. Travel about a mile to an intersection where there is a Dairy Queen on the right. Turn left here and continue to the first paved road on the right. turn right. Go past a dairy farm on the left to a T intersection. Turn right and park in the lot on the right before the bridge. **** We will explore the Conservancy property first and then, weather and time permitting, explore the adjacent tract school on the right. About 4 miles later, just past the white church on the left (Big Run Christian Church), bear to the right off 250. Travel .7 miles and turn right immediately past the large white house on the right. Travel 1.5 miles on Fish Ridge Rd. to a white house with a green roof (on the left). **** We will be taking a first look at second growth forest, overgrown pasture, and a deep valley streambed. The rugged terrain includes a steep descent to the valley and the return to the ridge.

May 22--Chartiers Creek, Allegheny/Washington Cos. Starting Time: 1:30 P.M.

Directions: From Pittsburgh, take I-79 south to the Bridgeville exit. Turn right at the end of the exit ramp and right again at the T intersection at the service stations. Several hundred feet south, turn left into King's Restaurant. Meet in the rear of the parking lot before going to

May 8--Harrisonville Shale Barrens, Fulton Co., PA Starting Time: 1 P.M.

Leader: Dorothy Fornof

Directions: From Pittsburgh take the Turnpike to Breezewood, where you exit to Rt. 30 east toward McConnellsburg. Travel 11 miles to Harrisonville at the intersection of Rts. 30 and 655. Continue east on 30; the road will climb and bend to the right. When it bends to the left at the shale cut, park on the left. **** We will see most of the specific shale barren species, and will be looking for the endangered Senecio antennaviifolius (cat's paw ragwort).

May 15--Home of wildlife author, Dr. Scott Shalaway, Fish Ridge, south of Cameron, Marshall Co., WV Starting Time: 1:30 P.M. Leader: Dr. Scott Shalaway . Directions: From Pittsburgh, take I-79 south to the Waynesburg exit. Take Rt. 21 to the West Virginia border, where it becomes Rt. 891. A few miles into WV, Rt. 891 ends at US 250. Turn left onto 250 and travel about 4 miles to Cameron.

Follow signs for 250 through town, past the high

in the rear of the parking lot before going to the site. **** We are going to visit a most outstanding station of *Camassia scilloides* (wild hyacinth) and some southern tree species introduced to the site. We will most likely travel to another location.

May 29--New Trail, Hell Hollow, McConnell's Mill State Park, Lawrence Co.

Starting Time: 1 P.M.

Leader: Esther Allen

Directions: From Pittsburgh, take I-79 north to the Portersville exit. Turn left onto Rt. 488 to the intersection with Rt. 19. Turn right onto Rt. 19 north. After 1.5 miles, turn left onto Kildoo Road or travel an additional .9 miles and turn onto Johnson Rd. Another entrance is from Rt. 422, west of I-79 and 19. On entering the park, follow signs to the Mill. Make a hard left and cross the covered bridge. Continue for .8 miles to Trusel Rd; turn left. Proceed 2.4 miles to Shaffer Rd.; turn left. Meet in the parking area .5 miles on the left. **** This trip is timed for the peak bloom of Kalmia latibolia (mountain laurel).
