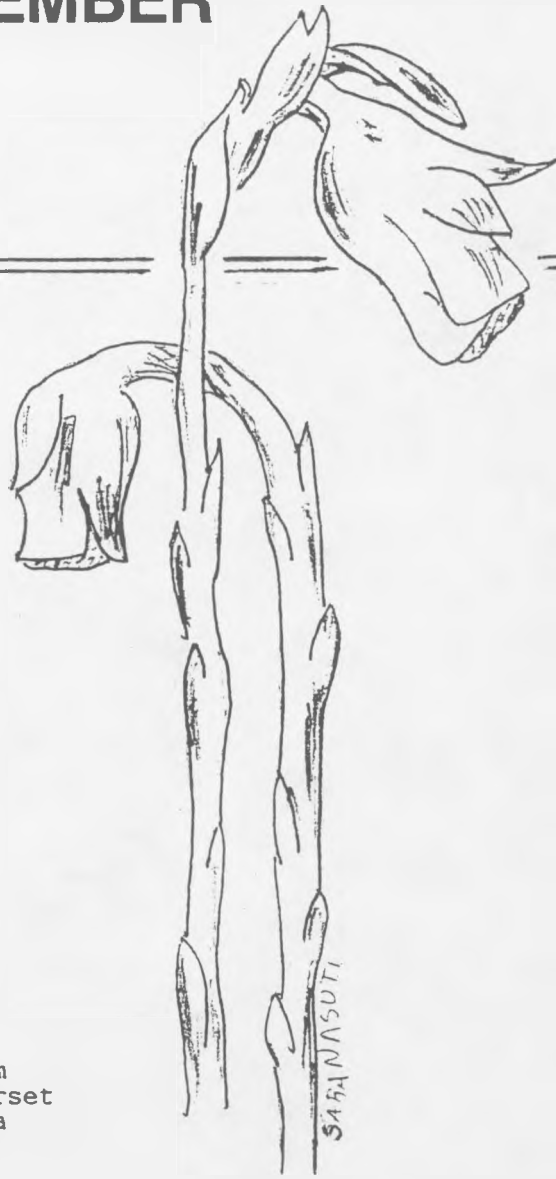

CLOSE ENCOUNTER OF THE THIRD TIME

It is not difficult to imagine how many hours Esther
Allen has spent out of doors in the tri-state's forests,

a bear. She has even dreamed vividly of a bear visiting
her in her own home. What a spoilsport I was to tell her
while we were camped on Dolly Sods of my two bear encounters
in PA and WV. Forty-five minutes after hearing her lament
and the telling of her dream, I enjoyed my third encounter.

For a split second on a treacherously narrow gravel
road descending from Dolly Sods, that encounter was almost
a horror story. As I rounded a curve, a black animal
much like the angus calf I had seen just minutes before was
sliding down the ten foot embankment onto the road--I was
going to hit it. I don't know whether I was more fearful
of skidding out of control or of smashing the animal's
legs. I couldn't focus on it because it was coming toward
my fender from the side and I was preoccupied with stopping
my vehicle. A glance at a pointed brown snout aborted the
cow theory. It hit the road at the same instant as the car
came to a stop and then didn't hesitate before it cut a
diagonal past my bumper. For those three seconds I studied
the fastest, healthiest looking bear I had ever seen. Its
long hair was lustrous, its big muscles bouncing on impact
with the ground, the hair around its padded feet bright
brown. Then it was over the opposite embankment. I got
out of the car and looked over the edge--there was not a
sight nor sound of it.

For most all of my adult life I had wanted to see a
wild bear here in the east, and now, within five years,
I've seen three. I know I will never have a closer
encounter than this one. How does it make me feel? Lucky,
very lucky.

My advice to Esther...stick with me, kid.

August 7, 1993--Moraine State Park, Butler County, PA

Starting Time: 1:00 P.M.

Leader: Esther Allen

Directions: From I-79 north take the Portersville exit and
turn left toward Rt. 19. Take Rt. 19 north and after
passing Rt. 488 on the left, take a road that goes off
to the right in a Y (West Park Drive). After going
over Rt. 422, travel less than a mile (?) to the bicycle
rental area on the North Shore Drive. **** We hope that
there will still be red and yellow milkweeds (*Asclepias*)
as well as Canadian burnet (*Sanguisorba canadensis*) although
a long plant list is guaranteed.

August 14, 1993--Wildflower Reserve

Raccoon Creek State Park, Beaver County, PA

Starting Time: 1:00 P.M.

Leader: Dr. Joan Gottlieb

Directions: From Pgh. take Rt. 30 west through Imperial.
Travel approximately 7 miles to the Reserve on the
right immediately before the park entrance. Meet at
the Nature Center. **** Dr. Gottlieb, who specializes
in the study of ferns, will demonstrate the Reserve as
a gem of biodiversity by showing us the twenty-six
different species of ferns, their varieties, and their
related allies that grow here.

August 21, 1993--Pontefract Park Area, Allegheny County, PA

Starting Time: 1:00 P.M.

Leader: Shirley Mutz

Directions: From Pgh. take Rt. 65 north through and beyond
Sewickley to the Quaker Valley Shopping Center. Turn
right onto the street that goes through the shopping
center; turn right onto Beaver Rd. Go about 200 yards
and park on the right. **** This area has an outstanding
diversity of plants including oddities such as *Ampelopsis*
(porcelain berry), wild poinsettia, and *Paulownia tomen-
tosa* (princess-tree). Bring protection from the sun.

August 28, 1993--North Park, Allegheny County, PA

Starting Time: 1:00 P.M.

Leader: Roger Hummel

Directions: North Park is a county park north of Pgh. that
can be reached from I-79 North; exit at Mt. Nebo Rd.
and follow yellow belt signs to the park. Meet in the
parking area on Wildwood Road (at the Babcock Blvd.
intersection) across from the cannon and the Tastee
Freez store. **** We will admire the *Gentiana clausa*
(closed or bottle gentian) at the nearby hillside
before walking over to Irwin Rd. to view autumn
composites.

September 4, 1993-- No trip scheduled.

September 11, 1993--Harrisonville Shale Barrens, Lutzville

Bedford and Fulton Counties, PA

Starting Time: 12:00 Noon *NOTE TIME*

Directions: From Pgh. take the Turnpike to Breezewood and
exit east onto Rt. 30 toward McConnellsburg. Travel 11
miles to Harrisonville at the intersection of Rts. 30
and 655. Continue east on 30; when the road bends to
the left at the shale barrens, park on the left. ****
This is a return to a great site to see species that
were not yet present in early May. Then we will return
via Rt. 30 to the village of Lutzville to explore the
streambanks for species indigenous to limestone areas.
We will see a lot in one day, so note the early
starting time.

September 18, 1993

September 25, 1993--I've decided to give September a rest this
year since there were virtually no
participants in last year's field trips.

October 2, 1993-- Greene County, PA

Starting Time: 1:00 P.M.

Leader: Dr. Mary Joy Haywood

Directions: Take I-79 south and exit at Ruff Creek. Turn
left and left again onto SR-221. Continue 4 or 5 miles
to Lippincott. Just past the second church (a converted
red brick school, Faith Baptist), turn left and meet at
the Haywood home (third house on the right, brick with
tall columns.
