Directions--From Pgh., travel north on I-79 and exit at Portersville; turn left toward Rt. 19. Take 19 north. After passing Rt. 488 on the left, take a road that goes off to the right in a Y (West Park Drive). Turn onto North Shore Drive near the Bicycle Rental and follow its curves for a mile or two. After going through a four way intersection (following the split in the road), turn right and park in the lot for the restaurant. If the gate is closed, park at the intersection.

We will see Nodding Ladies'-Tresses (Spiranthes cernua), several kinds of Goldenrod (Solidago spp.), and many different kinds of tree and shrub fruits.


