The catalog lists 279 (give or take a few) wildflower seeds and fern spores. Here is just a sampling --



The print of Teasel is made from a "Polaroid image transfer with watercolor" by one of our members, Janyce Erlich-Moss.

But....STOP! This is a "black and white" print. In no way does it capture the subtle hues of Janyce's original. Everything comes out stark black or stark white. It is a 180° turn.

The good news....you can see the full beauty of Janyce's artistry in an exhibition at The Carnegie Museum of Natural History, 4400 Forbes Ave., Pittsburgh. The exhibition is titled "PENNSYLVANIA IMPRESSIONS", and runs from January 18 to May 25, 1997. It is located in the Changing Exhibits Gallery behind Dinosaur Hall on the first floor.



"PENNSYLVANIA IMPRESSIONS" BY JANYCE ERLICH-MOSS

The artist tells you in her own words what her work is about --


In my landscape photography, I am trying to capture the fleeting perceptual and emotional experiences of a place, the time, the season and especially the light. The light in Western Pennsylvania is subdued, diffuse and not inherently dramatic. The subtlety of this light complements the soft, intricate shapes and textures of the natural environment. To convey the ambience and muted quality of eastern light and color, I use the photographic technique of Polaroid Image Transfer. By transferring the photographic image to watercolor paper and then painting on its surface, the normally crisp and glossy nature of the photograph changes to a unique combination of photography and watercolor painting. The images that result are one of a kind prints. The change in texture and delicate colors that result more effectively capture the mood of the moment. Each image has been selected not only for its visual impact and scenic beauty, but also for the almost spiritual mood which is evoked. I have attempted to convey the sense of tranquillity and sevenity of rocks, streams, flowers and forests.
