Describing the Walking Fern

The Reverend John Banister was an early botanist who was accidentally shot and killed while botanizing in 1692. He died before he published. His works have been compiled by Joseph and Nesta Ewan in *John Banister and His Natural History of Virginia 1678-1692* University of Illinois Press (1970). Below is an interesting account of a trip where Banister first describes the Walking Fern.


1685 or 1686

"In September last we occasionally took a journey towards, I might have said to the mountains, had not the Indians which were our guides been afraid as they pretended but I am apt to think it was policy not fear retarded them, and that they were unwilling to let us be acquainted with the recesses so far up in the country.our small path brought us to a vast rock...overspread with a swift fall of water... A little lower down this rivulet is received into a natural basin and from thence conveyed into a small vault of craggy rocks, where with its fall it makes a dead hollow sound, something like that of a kettledrum, but more like an Indian one, which is a skin stretched over an earthen pot half full of water. ... where among other Capillaries grows this small but rare kind of Harts Tongue [Walking Fern, Camptosorus rhizophyllus]. This plant grows erect as other of the like kind till nature calls it down to propagate; and when its offsets are strong enough to draw in their own alignment it leaves them and grows up as before."

A Botanical Term to Learn

Indeterminate. Describes an inflorescence in which the lower or outer flowers on a stalk bloom first, so the order of blossoming is from bottom to top. The stalk, never being stopped by a terminal flower, can continue to grow, producing flowers, one after another, for many weeks.

Field Trip Report

Raccoon Creek.

Raccoon Creek Wildflower Reserve, May 17th. Masses of Golden Ragwort Senecio aureus abutted by masses of white Spring Cress Cardamine bulbosa filled the flood plain next to

Miami Mist *Phacelia purshii* and the Green Violet *Hybanthus concolor* were not yet in bloom. One Nodding Trillium *Trillium flexipes* was in bloom. Several other Trilliums stumped us with traits belonging to both Nodding and Drooping.

Discovered by a close look: Round-leaved Ragwort Senecio obovatus, Palmate-leaved Violet Viola palmata and Orange-fruited Horse Gentian Triosteum aurantiacum.

Whites sprinkled: Goldenseal *Hydrastis canadensis*, Lyre-leaved Rock-Cress *Arabis laevigata*, and Early Saxifrage *Saxifraga virginiensis*.

Blues blooming: Wild Geranium Geranium maculatum, Greek Valerian Polemonium reptans, and Wild Blue Phlox Phlox divaricata.

Field Trip Schedule

Saturday June 7, 1997 -

Titus Bog, Erie County Leader: Jeanne Poremski Time: 1:00

Directions: From Pgh., take I-79 north to Rt. 6N (Edinboro exit) head east on 6N through Union City. After taking the turn out of Union City, drive 5.7 miles to the intersection of Rte. 89 North and 6N, where we will meet at a Drive-in Theater on the left.

This is our own bog, jointly owned by the Botanical Society and the Presque Isle Audubon Society. Expect to see orchids (arethusa, rose pogonia), buckbean, pitcher plant, and sundew. Plan on getting wet and climbing over tree trunks.

Directions: Take the Hopewell Exit off Rte 60. Go west (left) on Rte. 151. Shortly after you cross an iron bridge, you will see Columbia Gas on the corner. Turn right here onto Cowpath Road. Go about 1/2 mile to a sign for Independence Marsh and follow the driveway to parking area.

This will be the first opportunity for the Society to explore this wetland area.

Saturday June 28, 1997 -

Directions: From Pgh., take Rt. 28 north to Exit 17 at Rte. 356. Travel 0.9 miles, and turn right (across from a cinema) onto Monroe Road. Travel 1.3 miles to a fork in the road; take the right fork, onto Kepple Road. Travel at least 1.8 miles - look for a wooden sign on the right indicating the entrance to Todd Sanctuary's gravel parking lot.

This 160-acre tract of forest, streams, and thickets in SE Butler County is owned by the Audubon Society of W. Pa. We will search for ferns, fern allies, and the Virginia Snakeroot.
