Pennsylvania Rare Plant Forum will meet at Powdermill

The Pennsylvania Rare Plant Forum will be held Saturday, March 28, 1998, at Powdermill Nature Reserve, in Rector, Pennsylvania.

All people interested in the distribution and abundance of plant species in Pennsylvania are encouraged to attend this meeting. The Rare Plant Forum is an extension of the Vascular Plant Technical Committee of the Pennsylvania Biological Survey. In this capacity the Forum serves, indirectly but effectively, in an advisory role to the Bureau of Forestry for issues related to the conservation of the native flora of Pennsylvania.

Your input will be appreciated as we discuss issues related to the appreciation and conservation of our native flora. The primary task will be discussion of proposed changes to the list of Plants Of Special Concern In Pennsylvania (POSCIP).

This is also an excellent opportunity to socialize with other people, amateurs and professionals, who share your interest in the flora of Pennsylvania. You are also invited to an informal gathering on Friday evening to share slides.

Overnight accommodations will be offered at \$10 per person at Powdermill on a first come first serve basis. If there is sufficient interest, meals will be catered. Motels and restaurants are available in Ligonier, Donegal, and Somerset.

Field Trip Report

Moraine State Park, February 14th. Twentyone gloved and hatted folks saw samaras of Tulip Poplar (*Liriodendron tulipifera*), green branches of Sassafras (*Sassafras albidum*) and fuzzy buds of Cucumber Magnolia (*Magnolia*) *acuminata*). Near the shore were seedpods of Turk's Cap Lily and Swamp Rose Mallow.

Esther Allen showed us the horned oak gall and the target gall on a red maple, which is caused by a virus. We saw a nice patch of a lichen (*Cladonia sp.*) that is similar to the British Soldiers, but with brown tips.


Directions: Meet in the parking lot of Howard Johnson's on Route 51 (on the left side of the road when traveling south) near the intersection with I-70.
